

What an adventure: Jason Lewis started his mammoth trip in 1994

Coming home after c 13-year voya

HE HAS been attacked by a crocodile and arrested as a suspected spy on his epic expedition.

But yesterday British adventurer Jason Lewis began the final leg of his 13-year mission to travel around the world entirely under his own steam.

He set off in a pedal boat from Cape Grisnez, near Calais, despite warnings from the French coastguard that he could be breaking laws for crossing busy

shipping lanes.
The 40-year-old aims to finish his Expedition 360 by pedalling the 8m (26ft) craft up the Thames and crossing the Meridian Line at Greenwich, South-East London on Saturday - where he started the expedition in July 1994.

In that time Mr Lewis has used

kayaks, mountain bikes, in-line skates and the pedal boat to complete his 74,000km (46,000mile) journey. He was attacked by a 5.8m (17ft) saltwater crocodile in Australia and was arrested as a

potential spy in Egypt. He also suffered two broken legs when a car hit him in the US.

Mr Lewis bumped into actors Ewan McGregor and Charley Boorman in Sudan while on their 24,000km (15,000mile) bike trip down the length of Africa.

Mr Lewis, from Askerswell, Dorset, admitted that when his journey finishes 'it will be like a huge portion of my life over'
